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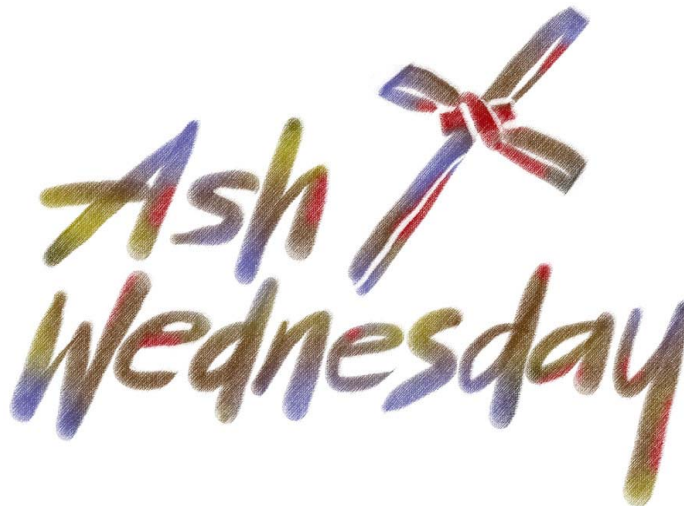

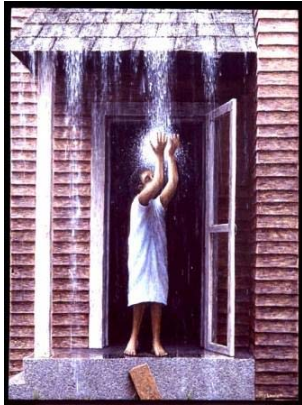

Doing church? Being the church?

On the Sunday of January 10th, celebrated as “The Baptism of Christ Sunday,” we did a very unique thing in worship that morning. As we heard about the sacraments and their role in our Christian faith, we all then took a rather bold step of responding to the message of the day and actually came forward (to the sound of rushing water in our quaint waterfall depiction) to remember our own baptisms, each one of us, and re-commit to the promises we made (or which others made for us) on those “initiation” days so long ago.

What promises, you ask? First, “To promise, by the grace of God, to be Christ’s disciple, to follow in the way of our Savior, to resist oppression and evil, to show love and justice, and to witness to the work and word of Jesus Christ as best we are able.” Secondly, “to grow in the Christian faith, and to be a faithful member of the church of Jesus Christ, celebrating Christ’s presence and furthering Christ’s mission in all the world.” These are the promises found in our baptism liturgy.

Why is this important? Every once in a while, especially at the start of a new year, everyone needs to re-examine what we’re really here for... what life’s meaning is, how that translates into our journey of faith, and especially how all this affects our existence together, as a congregation. What does it mean to say we’re Christ’s followers? How does this impact our ways of “doing” and “being” the church? Practically speaking (and New Englanders are very practical, we’re told), how does one then take this idea and turn it into real goals, steps, actions, and measures? How does our baptism (and our accompanying pledge to follow Christ’s ways) determine what we actually do each and every day of our new, “reborn” lives?

Being the church through doing

If all we’re here for is just to enjoy one another’s company, that’s not church. That’s a social club. Truly being the church involves hearing the Good Word, and then going out and doing something about it. We know that we all have different gifts – so for some, that means sharing the news with others, through teaching or conversation. For those with the gifts of mission, that means putting our faith into action through activities like emergency relief efforts for Haiti or California. For those whose gift is music, it means transforming the news into musical expression. For those with gifts of caring and hospitality, it means taking our love and compassion into the streets, by feeding the hungry, visiting the sick, welcoming the stranger... For those with a passion for social justice, it means working for initiatives that change our world for the better, through the civic arena, social service and non-profit organizations, or simply one person at a time, as Mother Teresa did. There are as many ways as there are gifts.

The biggest piece of the puzzle, in terms of how our lives fit into the picture of what it means to be Christ’s followers, is what we do with our faith. It means never being content and complacent, thinking that “somebody else will do it,” or “I don’t have to do anything except come to church.” Even if it’s something as simple as reaching out to others, and caring for all of God’s children the way we’ve been cared for, that’s what we’re ALL here for.

New Policy for winter storms & worship

After discussions with the church leadership about the policy of church closings for inclement weather, it was decided to take a new approach to the question of whether or not Sunday morning worship should be cancelled. It is the consensus that whenever possible, church would be open for Sunday service, even if only a handful of worshippers and the pastors are able to make it in. The thinking behind this is that if there are individuals who because of plowed-in streets, distance, concerns about driving, age, physical condition, etc., feel safer staying home, that will be *their* decision to make – and one that we will all respect. They should not feel any kind of obligation to attend which might endanger their own well-being. However, for the members who can make it, and feel a need for spiritual nurture, the doors will be open. In certain circumstances, the start time of Sunday worship may be delayed a couple of hours or so, to accommodate street clearing considerations.

When there are extreme conditions, the same TV channel will still be used to notify members: watch Channel 5, WCVB-TV to check the on-screen listings for news of delayed worship start times. Sometimes, because of the large number of closings or postponements, it may be some time before our church's name comes up in the rotation of announcements, so please be patient.

Rev. Liz Walker to speak at Homelessness Forum

How severe is the problem of homelessness in Massachusetts? Each night, over 3,000 families are being housed in temporary shelters or motels. Thousands more are doubled or tripled up, sharing apartments or moving from one location to another. The nation’s economic crisis has impacted not only the Boston area, but smaller towns and cities around the state, as well. Addressing this serious concern, the Rev. Liz Walker will be keynote speaker at the upcoming forum on family homelessness, “How Faith Communities Can Help End Homelessness: A New Vision,” scheduled for Sunday, February 28th.



The forum, which will take place from 3 to 5 PM at the First Parish Church in Concord, is being sponsored by the Advocacy Network to End Family Homelessness and Cooperative Metropolitan Ministries, and co-sponsored by the Episcopal City Mission and UU Mass Action Network. First Parish is located at 20 Lexington Road in Concord.

Other speakers include Elizabeth Curtis, Executive Director, Mass. Interagency Council on Housing and Homelessness and Mary Doyle, Metropolitan Boston Housing Partnership / MetroBoston Regional Network. State legislators from area districts will also be invited to comment on the issues.

Forum participants will learn of the goals and progress in the initiative against homelessness. More than that, they will hear about the vision for a new system in which shelters are used only for emergency transitions, everyone has a permanent place to live, and congregations and individuals join together in comprehensive programs to end homelessness. As a note of hope, attendees will discover how this vision is already being implemented, despite crushing budget cuts statewide.

Cooperative Metropolitan Ministries Mobilizing Boston area faith groups for social justice.

Union Congregational Church may be interested to learn of an interfaith group that includes over 100 congregations, nonprofit agencies, and educational institutions working together in the greater Boston area and surrounding towns



like ours since 1966 for the cause of social justice. Its name is Cooperative Metropolitan Ministries (CMM), and as a collaborative, grass-roots initiative, CMM is the area's oldest interfaith social justice network. Its mission is mobilizing "congregations and communities across economic, religious, racial, and ethnic boundaries" to address poverty, housing, and racial justice in Boston and to "link urban and suburban congregations in just, transformative partnerships."

Our own church's Mission Committee has expressed a desire to have Union Congregational Church become a partner in this fantastic interfaith ministry. We'll be hearing more about it at our Annual Meeting at the end of January.

For over 42 years, CMM has been tackling the most pressing social issues facing the area, in an effort to bring Dr. Martin Luther King's vision of a "beloved community for all citizens" to life. Its

greatest areas of concern right now are issues like:

- Youth violence prevention
- Poverty, housing, and homelessness
- Protecting the rights of immigrants, working people, and religious minorities
- Confronting domestic violence
- Promoting civic engagement
- Promoting regional responses to environmental justice, climate change, and the genocide in Darfur.

At times, its focus also turns to global issues, like mobilizing a compassionate response to the recent earthquake in Haiti. For individuals and faith groups wishing to offer help or make donations, more information is available at CMM's homepage,

Currently, CMM's members and partners include a wide range of faith traditions, including Jewish, Muslim, United Church of Christ, Catholic, American Baptist, United Methodist, Quaker, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Pentecostal, nondenominational, Unitarian Universalist, Bahai, and secular allies inspired by conscience – and they're always looking for new partner congregations like Union Congregational Church to join them.

There are a variety of opportunities for families or individuals to be part of ongoing programs like the Interfaith Youth Initiative, Partners for Justice Advocacy Network, Material Aid Program, one-on-one urban/suburban partnerships, interfaith cross-cultural education and dialogue, and numerous other activities. 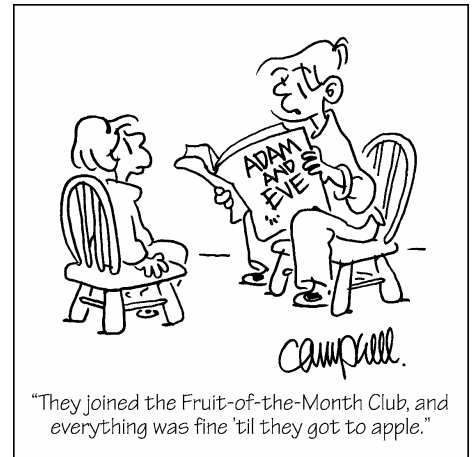
