A note from the Co-Pastors

Congregational meeting set for Oct. 18

Experiencing growth in our Sunday School this year is a cause for celebration – it also brings to mind a “picture story” we’d like to share. So, picture this: a small child – whether infant, toddler, or elementary school age – is not only a gift and a blessing to his or her proud parents. The child also brings along a whole host of other concerns and considerations. One doesn’t just have a child, and then say, “Okay, you’re on your own, kid!”

The child needs food, clothing, shelter, love, relationship – and a lot of other incidentals that are too easy to take for granted. So the parents, extremely aware of their responsibilities, know that they have to begin providing for all of these needs.

Some of the needs, in fact, require *change* – adding bedding or furniture, shifting rooms around, redecorating, changing household routines, re-figuring grocery shopping and meals, etc. Plus, when it comes to certain needs, like clothing, there is an ongoing, continuing need for constant change, refurbishing, re-purchasing. The infant soon grows out of baby clothes, and needs a new wardrobe almost every few months or so.

And so it is with a church. We can talk about goals being met, like the Sunday School growing bigger – but if we don’t do anything about follow-through, then we have a problem. The 2-year-old is still wearing baby clothes (and outgrown, tight, ripped, and soiled at that!), and there’s an urgent need to face up to the situation of not keeping up with the changes. (and what happens when we don’t!)

For churches, that includes the changes we see all around us in society, the changes in our local community, the changes in our families, and even the major changes within our congregation that have crept up on us through recent years.

So, like concerned parents, it’s time to get our heads together and talk about what we as a church family now need to do, recognizing what change means, what specific changes we’ve all experienced, how they affect us all, and what our next steps should be. And that’s why we’re going to be having a Congregational Meeting on October 18th.

Bring your questions, your thoughts, your concerns.

We invite you all to attend this very important meeting. This new initiative is the result of talks we’ve had with Church Council, Deacons, the Growth Committee, and other conversations among both church members and leaders. It’s a natural next step, now that the congregation has moved from interim ministry to settled pastorate.

So we’re going to be talking about the past, present, and future of Union Congregational Church... where we see God leading us in the years to come... what our roles will be as church members ... what concerns we may have about this process ... and how, then, to launch this bold, courageous journey of discovery and envisioning the future. In other words, we need your commitment, participation, and support for the next critical chapter of our lives together as a church family. See you on October 18th!

Some thoughts on church renewal

If you’ve ever remodeled a house while attempting to live in it, you have a sense of the chaos and complexity of congregational renewal. It will take far longer, cost you more, and prove messier than you ever imagined at the start. People who have worked with both church starts and church renewal will tell you that starting a church is easy compared to renewing one. The difficulty lies in the work itself. Pogo’s line holds true here: “We have met the enemy and he is us.”

A congregation is what it is today not because of what a bad pastor did to it, or because the neighborhood has changed, or because our culture is going to hell in a handbasket. Although those occurrences and many others have had an impact, a congregation is what it is today because of how it responded, or failed to respond, to the realities it faced. What a congregation will be in the future is up to each of its members, and how they work together to create something new from the realities they face. What the members do or don’t do now will make the difference. Their actions will either reinforce the patterns that have become established in the congregation, or start to counter and shift them. The leadership provided by a pastor can help or hinder, but it cannot make the congregation succeed or keep it from ultimately achieving the goals its set for itself.

The congregation’s inner work of transition has multiple steps. It begins with the recognition that something is wrong—that congregational life, while adequate, is missing something. Because a congregation is an outpost of the Christian church, the next step is to become anchored in a biblical and historical understanding of the purpose of church. When that purpose seems clear, the next step is to name and let go of preconceived notions about the form ministry should take. This step leads to a period of genuinely not knowing what to do. Rather than jumping in and filling that void with a quick solution, the challenge is to open ourselves to God and wait. From that place of expectant waiting, God’s leading is sensed and a path forward is chosen. Finally, actions are aligned with intent, and a new way of being and doing church is created. The congregation moves through these steps of transition only as individuals in the congregation are able to move through these shifts.

This inner work is the real work of renewal, and it is a work of the people. Pastors and outside consultants have much to offer, but they can’t do all the work for the people. It may help to think of renewal

as physical therapy for the body of Christ. The body is renewed as the people engage in practices that develop and strengthen the muscles of Christian discipleship and community. It isn’t easy work, but it’s worth it.

Sometimes problem solving is the best way to deal with an issue, but it should not be the only tool we have. There’s an old saying: “If all I have is a hammer, everything else looks like a nail.” We need other tools for addressing challenges in our churches.

Maybe instead of trying to solve the problem, we need a different course of action. We need to stop looking at every indication of resistance to change as a problem that needs to be solved. It may instead present an opportunity for deep and rich theological conversation. It can become a time for the entire congregation to grow and learn together through hearing one another. (For example, “worship wars” can often be opportunities for people to discuss in a much deeper theological sense what worship means to them and how they form community around worship gatherings.) What they need to help make it happen isn’t someone who comes in to fix the “problem,” but one who helps them think and talk through what it all means, bringing everyone to a deeper level of understanding and openness.

A helpful, alternative course of action is to “find a creative path.” The objective is not to install change, but to nurture it. John Scherer writes: “In order for change to be birthed, there have to be two parents present.” The first parent is pain. Pain must be present in order for a system to change, because otherwise the system is comfortable. Comfort stifles the sense of a need for change.

If, as Scherer asserts, there have to be two parents for change to be birthed, and the first parent is *pain*, the second parent is *possibility*. There has to be a sense of possibility of what could be, in order for people to want to move ahead. Too much pain and anxiety in the system can cripple it. Possibility balances out the pain, keeping the system open to response. So after people become aware of the need for change, they need to begin to get glimpses of “what could be.” If we can all just stop trying to solve problems and instead talk about the possibilities of what could be, then we are at the threshold of change.

We are off to a great start for the 2009/2010 Church School year! We have 3 Sunday School classrooms based on school grade: K-3, 4-6 and 7+. For the younger two classes, we will be using *One Room Sunday School* again this year. It's meant for church schools where the children are a variety of ages and there is a limited teaching staff. The curriculum provides activities that the whole room does as a group but also age appropriate activities for non-readers up to skilled readers. The older class will be working on a special curriculum called *God and Church* which when successfully completed, can earn them a special Girl Scout or Boy Scout award.

For grades K-6, we will be learning about children making a difference, Old Testament miracles and then New Testament miracles. The second half of the year, we will be learning about Joseph, Moses and God form a people. The class will complete 3 projects and create a video to share what they have learned on their faith journeys.

Cookies for Friends

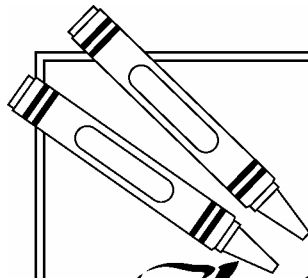
Autumn is the perfect time of the year to sow kindness and reap a "harvest" full of friendships. Make this special treat to share with someone.

What you need:

- An adult to help
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 cup cooked or canned pumpkin
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 1/2 cups diced, roasted almonds
- 1 cup chocolate pieces
- Raffia or fall-colored ribbon (optional)

What you do:

1. Cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy.
2. Beat in egg, pumpkin and vanilla.
3. In separate bowl, mix flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, nutmeg and cinnamon.
4. Add dry mix to creamed mixture.
5. Add almonds and chocolate pieces; mix thoroughly.
6. Drop by teaspoons onto well-greased cookie sheets.
7. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes or until lightly browned.
8. Cool on racks. Makes about six dozen.
9. Stack two cookies on top of each other. Then tie them like a present with the raffia or ribbon. Give the cookies to friends and family to thank them for their friendship.
